Amalek came and fought with Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, "Pick some troops for us, and go out and do battle with Amalek. Tomorrow, I will station myself on the top of the hill, with the rod of God in my hand." Joshua did as Moses told him and fought with Amalek, while Moses, Aaron, and Hur went up to the top of the hill. Then, whenever Moses held up his hand, Israel prevailed; but whenever he let down his hand, Amalek prevailed. But Moses' hands grew heavy; so they took a stone and put it under him and he sat on it, while Aaron and Hur, one on each side, supported his hands; thus his hands remained steady until the sun set. And Joshua overwhelmed the people of Amalek with the sword. Then a said to Moses, "Inscribe this in a document as a reminder, and read it aloud to Joshua: I will utterly blot out the memory of Amalek from under heaven!" And Moses built an altar and named it Adonai-nissi. He said, "It means, 'Hand upon the throne of 'r will be at war with Amalek throughout the ages."

## **Text Ouestions**

- 1. This occurs only two chapters after *Bnei Yisrael*, the Israelites, were saved and the Egyptians pursuing them were killed. Can you think of other examples in *Tanakh* or in modern Israeli history where deliverance/salvation is followed by crisis? Why do you think this is so often the case?
- 2. Discuss the symbols in these verses: the hill, the staff, and the stone.
- 3. Why must Moshe specifically write this all down?
- 4. Who works the hardest in this story?
