# JEWISH DAY SCHOOLS AND YESHIVAS <br> Facts at a Glance:A A Summary of Key DASL Data 2023-2024 School Year 

## Background

Prizmah: Center for Jewish Day Schools is committed to supporting Jewish day school and yeshiva leaders with research and data to support data driven decision making and providing landscape research for the Jewish day school ecosystem. In partnership with the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS), Prizmah operates a Jewish day school and yeshiva benchmarking cohort within NAIS' data collection and benchmarking tool called Data and Analysis for School Leadership (DASL). DASL is an online data collection tool designed for school leaders to find actionable on key school operational metrics such including admission, enrollment, salaries, development, financial operations and more. The tool gives individual school professionals the ability to create peer comparison groups and custom benchmarking reports on topics of interest. Over 1800 independent schools in the US and Canada enter data annually into DASL. This report is for heads of school, executive directors, business managers, development directors, admission directors, and boards of directors.

In the 2023-2024 school year, 122 Jewish day schools entered data into the two required sections, tuition and enrollment. While some schools complete the whole tool, not all schools did, therefore the number of respondents for each field varies. This report is an amended version of NAIS' Facts at a Glance for Jewish Day Schools and Yeshivas. The data is about the 2023-2024 school year unless otherwise indicated.

This report is not a representative sample of the field of Jewish day schools. It is a reflection of the 122 schools that responded. We have included an analysis of schools that have shared their data. This report is intended to provide individual schools with a basis for comparison within a particular category or metric. Due to the varying number of responses for each data-point, comparing metrics reported herein to one another is not recommended.

## Profile of Respondents

The sample of schools that participated in 2023-2024.

Participating schools vary by grade level. Schools that have preschools, kindergartens or start in first grade through seventh or eighth grade represent $48 \%$ of the participating schools. Twenty-one percent of schools are preschools/kindergarten through 12th grade and $13 \%$ are stand alone high schools. The remainder serve other grade level breakdowns.

The majority of respondents, representing $56 \%$, were affiliated with Community and Pluralistic schools. Conservative affiliated schools accounted for $8 \%$ of respondents, while reform schools accounted for 7\%. Orthodox schools were found to be underrepresented in this data collection, constituting $29 \%$ of respondents and nearly $50 \%$ of the Prizmah network of schools.
